

LSAT and Logic Games Resources:

You may want to examine these in person at a bookstore before purchasing. Keep in mind that there are likely used copies available online. Tip: start early by working *only* on your most difficult section.

I. Logic Games (analytical reasoning):

Also, please note that the recommendations we have received are anecdotal, not based upon statistical results. Other resources may be as good or better. Your reaction to these books may be different. Be sure to adequately research what is available on your own.

- a. *****LSAT Logic Games Bible** by Powerscore—a methodological approach: very helpful and detailed. This book comes **very highly recommended** from several sources, including many students who were able to substantially improve their performance on this difficult section. If you are doing poorly, give yourself *at least* 2-3 months if you want maximum benefit. It works, but it does take time. They now have a similar **Logical Reasoning Bible** that has also received great reviews.
 - b. Kaplan's *LSAT 180*. For those poised to break through the 160 barrier and beyond. It tackles the most difficult types of problems on the exam. Use this book in addition to a "regular" LSAT prep book.
 - c. Dell or Official "Logic Problems" books. [If you haven't seen these, they are like crossword puzzle books, only filled with logic problems. They usually contain about 60 or 70 items, ranging from easy to difficult. The charts are pre-drawn, and the problems are not exactly like the LSAT logic games. They are similar enough to give some great practice, especially at finding all the inferences from a particular statement or set of statements. These books might be particularly useful if the LSAT is a long way off for you and you'd like a head start on this (often) most difficult section. Believe it or not, they are for hobbyists and are meant to be fun.]
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II. General LSAT Prep.

The LSAT exam has been in its present form for many years—so virtually all of the commercial prep books are good. The following two were selected by HPPLC's veteran LSAT instructors after their review of what's available now. Other resources may be as good or better.
